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MINISTER'S REPORT

I would like to thank God for all those who over the last 12 months have served our congregation in a variety of ways. From my personal files, I note we have added 11 new members in 2023 including 4 by baptism and 7 by transfer of membership. This past year I officiated or participated in 13 funerals. Corner House members who passed in 2023 included Georgia Bosley, Don Stewart, Lorainne Roskie, Carol Conn, Tom Telega, Mike Gustovich, William Gregory, Ernie Cunningham and one of our ordained Timothy's from the past, Don Critzer. Many of our members and attendees have experienced the loss of loved ones in the past year. During the year I conducted 2 weddings.

Corner House also celebrated the new arrival of several new babies. Congratulations to Shawn and Kim on the arrival of Alexandria (Lexi). Jake and Kelsey on the arrival of Miles. Christian and Corinne on the arrival of Lucas. Gavin Migletts and Megan Murphy on the arrival of Stella.

I am thankful for the many opportunities God has given us to grow in the ministries that we have throughout our church and community. God has given us many things to celebrate as we look forward to the new year. We are an active church and as a result God is blessing us with children for the future. Just maybe we can re-populate the house with babes and toddlers who

will grow with us through adolescence and into a life-long relationship with Jesus Christ. Those children will bring more families and hopeful growth to our numbers.

I'm hopeful 2024 can be a year of the child at CHCC. Why not? Jesus often referred to His disciples as children. (Matthew 18:5,6 and 10; Mark 10:4) Looking back on 2023, we have had a year filled with church activities for the child in us all. From Car Cruises (3 in our parking lot last year) to ATTAP functions (2 in the past year), our Saturdays have been hopping busy.

Our Refuel program is off to a great start this past fall with classes and activities for all ages, not to mention the best dinner and fellowship in the area. Our children hosted an awesome banquet for our seniors last April and were featured in an Easter Pageant and a Christmas Drama on Christmas Eve.

Our youth programs are looking ahead to the future with good vision and a full staff of volunteers to lead. Activities included a Super Bowl Party, a Movie night and Game nights.

Our new Pavilion is looking good with the addition of landscaping and a fire pit. We look forward to the additional playground equipment to be added in the future to complete the project.

Our worship ministry hosted the area Thanksgiving Service and the Compassionate Friends Candlelight Vigil. I also co-directed the HCIA National Day of Prayer service as well. Our church family participated in the Salvation Army Red Kettle Drive.

We continue to provide food on the 3rd Friday of each month at the Mahoning Valley Rescue Mission. Our Monthly Food Drive and Food Bank have helped many families get by during these hard times. We distribute on average around 35-40 bags of food each month.

Our mission's ministry continues to impact countless lives as we fulfill our church vision of being a voice of hope to our church, community, and world. We thank our congregation for their stewardship and generosity as we encourage missionaries and people groups far and wide with our monthly contributions.

Our ladies continue to lead in so many positive ways. Whether teaching, or leading children's ministry preparing meals setting up our Coffee corner or baking pies and pastries for fund raisers - what a team.

Our Men's Breakfast continues to serve and equip men. Our monthly gathering includes a delicious home cooked breakfast as well as a time of sharing and devotion. Last year our women participated in the Elkhorn Valley Woman's Retreat with our Worship Team leading the music. Our men also attended the Elkhorn's Man Camp and some of our guys assisted with the Rally in The Valley at Stambaugh Auditorium last spring. Our Senior Citizens also attended Senior Day at Elkhorn Valley, not to mention the many Corner House children who attended various summer camp programs at Elkhorn.

We are proud to be a church that hosts the community through AA meetings, AATAP, Twin State Auto, Yoga and Zumba classes and the Girl Scouts.

I am amazed by God's work in raising up young men who seek God and who might aspire to take on leadership roles here at CHCC in the future.

Perhaps the most exciting aspect of our ministry at Corner House is the number of post pandemic newcomers who have plunged in to take ownership in various aspects of our church. I have personally sensed a great spirit at CHCC in recent months. Newcomers are not only staying faithful to their attendance, but are getting involved by attending Bible Study, volunteering for ministry, and taking a more active role in the congregation.

We have also seen more young people in their 20's - 40's actively attending and involved at Corner House in the last year than we have in a long time. We must invest in younger leaders because they are the ones who are going to make sure the church is carried forward into the future. Thank God for their vibrancy and energy. May God be forever glorified.

As we look ahead to 2024, we want to turn our focus to the NEXT GENERATIONS. This coming year we need to be more and more generationally focused on our prayers and in our strategic planning.

Also, our vision for the future must be continually emphasized. Our actual VISION TEAM will need to expand in 2024. Our elders are committed to a twofold vision emphasis for the future. DEACON'S REPORT

Started the year with \$292, finished the year with \$552.28. It was a year generous giving to the benevolent fund, which helped us bless more people this year. These programs, such as helping put gas in their vehicles to get back in forth to work or doctors' appointments, stays at the Happy Campground down the street for those that are homeless, helping keep utilities on, building ramps for people to get out of their homes, and helping those who were in need of supplies for their babies. If we are unable to help with these opportunities, we send them to Hubbard Chrisitan in Action or Hubbard Salvation Army, that is why we ask for volunteers for the Red Kettle campaign, those dollars stay in our area.

Dave Coxson has been our representative to HCIA but cannot always attend the meetings to see what is happening. We really need to get a representative from our church at the meetings for HCIA (Hubbard Christian in Action), if you would like to volunteer to be our representative, please see Dave Coxson. Our Men's breakfast continues to meet the 1st Saturday of the month, ALL men are invited to join us.

From our benevolent fund we were able to help families with utilities (\$412.66), families with gas for their vehicles (\$139.29), and families with baby needs (\$100.00), helped a family purchase a wheelchair at Goodwill (\$6.35), helped people with car payments (\$385), helped families building a ramp (\$138.25), and helped a gentleman pay for a tent space at Happy Campgrounds (\$48). We have had a lot of individuals and families come to us for help who are living out of their vehicles for many different reasons.

The food giveaway helped roughly 35-40 families a month (\$3859.91). The December giveaway saw 55 cars come through. We are getting more and more homeless coming through the distribution, that is the reason we are asking for pop top cans if possible. We were blessed during the giveaways to the volunteers' stocking shelves, packing the bags, handing out the food, praying with those that came through, or the food and monetary donations from all of you.

ADULT EDUCATION REPORT

Adult Bible studies are overseen, and curriculum is approved by the Elders. Dave Coxson offers Zoom Bible study at 6pm on Tuesday evenings. Jerry Coxson has a Bible study of The Lookout monthly lessons on Wednesday evenings. Shelly Best and Dave Coxson facilitates "You'll Get Through This" Bible study on Wednesday might. Chuck Thompson facilitates a Bible study at the home of Art and Jennifer Fisher on Thursday evenings at 6:30pm. Sunday morning offers 2 Bible study classes at 9:30am, Nanette Thompson's class is in the conference room, Judy Longley's class is in the 4-6 grade room.

CHILDREN'S EDUCATION REPORT

Children's curriculums are selected by the Discipleship ministry and approved by the Elders.

In summary, 2023 was an engaging and special year. Some of our activities were a true reflection of our children's growth in Christ.

Elkhorn Christian Service Camp was enjoyed by some of our kids. All our kids participated in fund raising activities to offset the cost of some of the programs.

Children's programs also included growth within Corner House. Our kids hosted an Earth Day event. Multigenerational Dinner and activities. The Children performed 2 dramas. The first drama was the Last Supper. Each child played an important role in the last days of Jesus's life on Earth. Steve Shrader assisted in the success of the performance. Our Christmas program was also performed dramatizing the Birth of Christ. Our younger children participated in the actual drama and the Teen's created the props and assisted in the scene transitions.

We hosted 2 Autism Events in 2023. Easter and Halloween events.

As an opportunity to offset some Children's costs, the children and several Adults within the Church volunteered their time and resources to bake over 70 pies. The pies were offered with a suggested donation of \$10. Our discipleship committee determined that we needed to complete an interest survey to find people who may be interested in supporting the Children's Program in a variety of ways. As a team, we identified and invited people who may be interested in attending the meeting. We had 22 in attendance and 13 completed surveys; we reviewed the surveys during the following discipleship meetings with some of those getting involved in some way or giving the committee some ideas.

In February we held an Autism Training for the teachers and anyone in the community who would benefit from the program. Justin Meade presented. Also, CHCC hosted Vendors and offered a hot lunch.

Late Spring, teens enjoyed a gameday and the Grade School kids went to Steak and Shake and Extreme Air. All the kids had a wonderful time.

A new nursery program was discussed all year. February 2024 the program will be coordinated by Sandra Perry with an open house of Muffins and Moms and March Donuts with Dad. Refuel ended in April 2023 and restarted September 2023.

The teens enjoyed a bonfire in the late spring.

Every Sunday we offer classes for our young people with inspirational and Christian based curriculum. Throughout the fall and winter, we offer each Wednesday night a time of dinning together, fellowship, devotion and learning God's plan and word.

In conclusion, our ministry meeting comes together every third Tuesday of every month at 6:30 PM. Our committed members of this team work tirelessly to find engaging, unique and Christian Growth opportunities for all ages. We would welcome new members to join us with your splendid ideas.

Our Discipleship ministry group meets the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 pm. Anyone is welcome to attend!

When a financial need was expressed, faithful and generous giving provided for

that need. We continue to see evidence that God is working in the lives of His people here at Corner House.


We are very grateful for all who participate in the financial needs of Corner House. There are 144 families that attend Corner House either in person or by social media. Only 45 of those families support the church financially, that's just 31%. Giving is sacrificial and is necessary for church growth. Tithing provides curriculum for adults and children, special services, along with the basic needs of the church building. Missions Ministry received 14% of our general fund to support community and international missions. Furthermore, it allows our church to reach out to the community and the world with the love of Jesus by providing spiritual and physical needs. Jesus Christ is the ultimate giver and the reason to worship with giving.

The finance ministry team works diligently to meet the church's financial obligations and manage the business side of the church. We research ways to cut costs and have recently implemented a new and 50% less expensive church management program. With a new payment platform, we have reduced the processing fee by 1% for online giving.


